PROPOSED VOTER INITIATIVE MEAS-URE ON SEWER BOND INDEBTEDNESS

AMEND THE LAKE HAVASU CITY, AZ CODE OF ORDINANCES BY ADDING A NEW ORDINANCE, CHAPTER 3.40 SEWER SYSTEM. §3.40.020 SEWER BONDED INDEBTEDNESS. THIS ORDINANCE SHALL REQUIRE LAKE HAVASU CITY TO PAY THE SEWER BONDED INDEBTEDNESS NOT OUT OF SEWER FEES UNDER AN EXISTING ORDINANCE, BUT BY EITHER PROPERTY TAXES OR DEDICATED SALES TAXES OR BY A COMBINATION THEREOF.

- 5) Refinance debt over longer period of time.

Will you help change the sewer fee system?

A scientific survey was commissioned by Dr Ullery in April 2013 of a core group of 6,000 Havasu voters. By an overwhelming majority, 91% of the surveyed Havasu voters agreed that changes must be made to reduce current sewer fees. Moreover, 73% would vote for a "sewer flatrate" not tied to water usage. 70% preferred multiple methods of fees and taxes to reduce monthly sewer fees.
